DIRECTIONS

Method 1: At-Home Play

- 1. Cut out drawing pieces and as many copies of AHC Bingo Markers as you need. There are 4 different bingo boards, so this game can be played with up to 4 players.
- 2. Place all the drawing pieces in a hat, bowl, or other container. Have an outside participant draw pieces out one by one while players mark that architectural element on their boards with the AHC Bingo markers. Note that not all boards have all elements pictured. Players can also take turns drawing from the hat themselves.
- 3. Keep going until someone has a Bingo! Refer to the glossary for more information about each architectural element.

Method 2: Outdoor play

- 1. All of these elements can be found throughout Portland, often in a single neighborhood. Go for a walk through your favorite neighborhood and try to spot as many architectural elements as you can on the buildings you pass. Keep in mind that you may see multiple elements on one building!
- 2. The first player to reach five squares in a row wins. For an extra challenge try to find all the squares on your board.

GLOSSARY OF ARCHITECTURAL TERMS

Bargeboard – a board, typically ornamental, fixed to the gable end of a roof to hide the ends of the roof timbers

Bay Window – a window built to project outward from an outside wall

Bracket – a device of wood, stone, or metal that projects from or overhangs a wall to carry a weight

Dentils – small, rectangular blocks resembling teeth and used as a decoration under the soffit of a cornice

Exposed Rafters – a series of uncovered sloped structural members such as wooden beams that are designed to support the roof deck

Eyebrow Dormer – A low and wide dormer with a curved roof and no sides

Fishscale Shingles – shingles having straight sides and rounded bottoms

Gambrel Roof – a roof with two sides, each of which has a shallower slope above a steeper one.

Gothic Arch – a narrow arch with a pointed top

Half Timbering – walls with a timber frame and a brick or plaster filling

Keystone – a central stone at the summit of an arch, locking the whole together

Leaded Glass – a usually decorative window made from small pieces of glass fastened together with lead strips

Oculus – a small window that is circular or oval in shape

Palladian Window – a large window consisting of a central arched section flanked by two narrow rectangular sections

Pediment – the triangular upper part of the front of a building in classical style, typically surmounting a portico of columns

Pilaster – a rectangular column, especially one projecting from a wall.

Portico – a porch leading to the entrance of a building

Roman Brick – a type of brick with longer and flatter dimensions than those of standard modern bricks

Round Arch – a type of arch with a semicircular top

Shed Roof – a roof having only one sloping plane and no hips, ridges or valleys

Shutters – pair of hinged panels fixed inside or outside a window that (theoretically) can be closed for security or privacy or to keep out light

Sidelights – narrow windows or panes of glass set alongside a door or larger window

Soldier Bricks – bricks laid vertically with their long narrow sides exposed

Spindlework – decorative trim around a porch

Tudor Arch – a low, wide type of arch with a pointed apex

Turret – a small tower on top of a larger tower or at the corner of a building or wall, typically of a castle

Wraparound Porch – a shallow veranda enclosing two or more sides of a house
